FAMILY MATTERS

In the past two Employee Engagement surveys, 95% of employees rated family as a central to their lives and 88% recognized the value of family time to other employees. I saw the importance of family first-hand recently.

No Horsing Around: New Equine Therapy Center Under Construction



Just as the first blush of spring promises relief from the harsh cold of the South Dakota winter, another promise is emerging on the north end of St. Joseph's Indian School's campus – an Equine Therapy

become home-away-from-cold for the šunkawakhán who reside here, but also the 19,200-square-foot building will include a large riding area, tack rooms, a wash bay, a classroom, bathrooms, offices, an observation area and a kitchenette. The realization of the center means that the therapy program, like the U.S. Mail, can go on despite snow, rain, neat and gloom of night.

We are blessed by the kindness of donors to be able to proceed with the project. The Equine Therapy program impacts our students beyond measure.

The addition of the Equine Therapy Center allows St. Joseph's the opportunity to host OK Corral Training for staff and area therapists interested in the series. The three-day seminars encompass various equine therapy topics, including the basics, team building, employee assistance with an emphasis on veterans, crisis management, mental health issues and group dynamics.

Other equine therapy facts:

- More than 50 students participated in equine therapy during the past school year.
- Plans are underway to host two or three family camps this summer, each serving up to three families.
- By publication of this newsletter, the school's first-owned horse, Grandma, will give birth.

Accounting's work consists of several yearly, recurring projects and occasional special projects. Once the December books are closed, the budget process begins with 16 directors and numerous departments from across the organization. That's a lot of collaboration carefully timed to meet the Province's deadline.

The team strives for an unqualified (extensive) audit each year, which requires in-depth preparation before auditors arrive for a week on campus to dig through receipts, review data and interview staff. Imagine what it was like going through a virtual audit this past year.

Christina's unique role is preparing bills and invoices for payment by verifying, classifying and recording accounts payable data. Check requests sent through PaperSave go to her, and she processes checks and automated clearing house (ACH) payments twice weekly. Christina also manages magazine and newspaper subscriptions. She enjoys spending time with her family, fishing, golfing and

Among Darcie's many duties, she heads up reconciliation of the Chamberlain Food Center charge account, petty cash accounts and the majority of Wells Fargo pCard accounts. Turn in receipts for all of these purchases to her along with receipts of revenue cash, miscellaneous cash and checks for reconciliation and deposit. She also checks out the commercial Walmart and Menard's charge cards and donated gift cards. Accuracy is her specialty and probably what makes her an excellent dart player. She also enjoys playing cards, yard work and refinishing furniture.

Most of Gwen's responsibilities are focused on outside affiliations: Native Hope, Sacred Heart Center, Lower Brule Ministries and the SCJ's. For Native Hope and Lower Brule Ministries, she takes care of accounts payable and the credit card expense reporting. For Sacred Heart Center, she handles credit card expense reporting, accounts payable; billings to the state for childcare services; accounts receivables for childcare services' billing; cash deposits; compiling, submitting, and reconciling all state and federal grant reimbursements; sales tax; and assisting with budget and audit work. For the SCJ's, she processes accounts payables and accounts receivables. When applicable, she also does 1099s for the outside companies. Some of her other responsibilities are for St. Joseph's. In her free time, she enjoys playing volleyball, reading and spending time with her family.

Becky is responsible for the audit and budget for the Sacred Heart Center, Native Hope, Lower Brule and the SCJs. She handles the 990 for the Sacred Heart Center and Native Hope and assists in maintaining accounting software such as GP, Papersave, Counterpoint, and Dynac. They boarded buses and headed west to the tourist parking area across from Al's Oasis and Buche Foods in Oacoma, S.D., to remove trash and debris defacing Unčí Makȟá's beauty. Native Hope gave each student a t-shirt designed by local Native American artist Dennis Metcalf to commemorate regard for care for the planet. Grateful for their effort, Buche Foods met students for a photo opportunity and shared a snack provided by the grocery store and Al's Oasis.



Other students identified a desire to save the Australian koalas. They researched the Wildlife Warriors at Australian Zoo Animal Hospital, who are involved in care for the koalas orphaned, injured and without food because of the past year's wildfires. The class decided to charge staff and students a small fee to have their photo taken at the "koala photo booth" during the week. Staff pitched in to construct the booth, and the proud students surpassed their fundraising goal of \$75 to earn \$125 for the hospital.



For the past 26 years, students and staff at St. Joseph's Indian School walk for sobriety in April.
